Now, two years later, the IPCC is preparing its next comprehensive report entitled "Climate Change 2022" and is calling on business and industry to help contribute to the development of the report.

During the webinar, you will hear from IPCC lead scientists about the latest climate science and what this means for business, as well as from business leaders on how they are already integrating the IPCC findings into their business strategies.
